
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

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NCHE Celebrates Forty Years: The Battle Begins (1985-1987)

North Carolinians for Home Education is celebrating our fortieth anniversary this year! This article is part two in a series that recounts the history of the modern homeschool movement in NC (see the first article in the spring issue of GREENHOUSE). We continue to express our gratitude for the hard work of NCHE leaders to support homeschool parents and to make NC a wonderful place to homeschool. It is time to remember, celebrate, and be grateful.

I'd like to continue to share portions of the series of Facebook posts that Debbie Mason wrote outlining the history of NCHE and homeschooling in NC. Debbie, our events director and media director, and her husband Spencer, our law and policy director and office administrator, have been serving on the NCHE board since the 1980s.

First Attacks on Homeschool Freedom

While the NCHE leadership was praising God for the Delconte decision, they knew they would soon be in a fight to keep the right to educate their children at home. In the March/April *Greenhouse Report* (mailed on May 24, 1985), they warned, "We must be more watchful than ever to protect our freedoms. Already the media, public educationists, and some legislators are saying, 'Now that it's legal, we need to regulate it." In the same issue, NCHE encouraged homeschoolers to work to keep the then-current law unchanged, to comply with the law, and to keep the quality of homeschool instruction high. They also advised, "Be ready to drop everything and go to Raleigh at a moment's notice. The battle is only beginning."

Senator Dennis J. Winner introduced a bill to set up a study commission on home education. It was tentatively approved and went to the appropriations committee. Members of NCHE went to see the appropriations committee chairman to tell him that homeschools fell under the private school law he had championed and that we did not want this study commission. The chairman promised that the study commission would not be funded, and it was not.

About that same time, the senior associate superintendent of public schools sent a document to all superintendents of North Carolina public schools asking them to support legislation that would give the state tight regulation over homeschools. The document said that legislation should be passed to add the following changes to the existing homeschool requirements:

- "1. Parent teachers must have a college education.
- 2. The state should set a required course of study.
- 3. Minimum standardized test scores should be established, and tests should be monitored by qualified personnel.
- 4. Parents should notify school officials of their intent to homeschool.
- 5. Nonpublic school legislation should be amended to require that each nonpublic school notify the appropriate local board of education of every enrollment and every dropout or dismissal that occurs during the school year. The nonpublic school should also notify authorities of anyone who does not graduate and does not return the following year."

State officials branded home educators as fanatics who were imprisoning their children, not allowing them to come into contact with anyone whose views might be opposed to their own. They were depicted as people who had stepped out of the mainstream of America. Words such as "child neglect" and "child abuse" were used frequently by the press. State officials claimed that homeschools were poorly regulated and would stunt the educational and social growth of children. Editorial columns again carried the cry for the regulation of homeschools. One editorial suggested that a functionally illiterate parent could homeschool, and that this concern was not so farfetched since "a distressingly high percentage of North Carolinians are functionally illiterate." It was ironic that the accusations that so many North Carolina parents were functionally illiterate were a condemnation of the very educational system they were claiming to support.

After the Delconte case, NCHE focused on lobbying and teaching homeschoolers how to lobby. They knew that the time would come when they would have to fight in the General Assembly for their rights to homeschool. They encouraged homeschoolers to contact their legislators with these three messages:

- North Carolina homeschoolers are committed, conscientious, lawabiding, intelligent, and friendly people.
- 2. Homeschools are an effective means of education.
- 3. Our desire is for our existing protection under the 1979 "Church School" law to be left untouched.

A Restrictive Bill

In April 1987, the Department of Public Instruction (DPI) proposed legislation entitled "An Act to Permit Home Instruction under Certain Conditions, as a Means of Complying with Compulsory School Attendance Requirements." Under this proposed legislation, homeschools would be under the authority of DPI and local boards of education. Homeschool teachers would be required to have a college education and to teach a state-approved curriculum. This proposal also required a six-hour school day and gave the local school authorities the ability to deny permission for a family to homeschool based on a twice-a-year, subjective review of their homeschool.

As soon as NCHE heard of this potential bill, we responded immediately by asking homeschoolers to write, phone, and visit their legislators.

On April 17, 1987, Representative Tyndall introduced HB 837 for its first reading. This bill was identical to the DPI proposal. Immediately, NCHE members began to flood Raleigh with letters and calls. On April 30, Senator Marvin introduced SB 779, which was virtually identical to HB 837. Then on May 1, Senator Hardison introduced a substitute bill, SB 708, which was a proposal put forward by DNPE director Rod Helder. While SB 708 was less restrictive than HB 837 and SB 779, NCHE lobbied against it as well as the other two bills.

On May 14, both Senate bills came before the Senate Education Committee, and they were both sent to a subcommittee for additional study. By May 18, SB 779 had received an unfavorable report, and there had been no action on SB 708. From May 19 through August 11, HB 837 went through several subcommittee and committee meetings, was revised five times, and finally passed its third reading in the House. During this time, it became apparent that DPI was orchestrating the entire process.

The House passed HB 837. Because money was requested for the 1987-1988 fiscal year, it was sent to the Senate Appropriations Committee for approval. When the 1987 legislative session came to an end, HB 837 was still waiting for Appropriations Committee approval. With the State Board of Education backing these bills and HB 837 having already been passed by the House, it seemed inevitable that both bills would pass in the 1988 short legislative session.

But the story was not over. NCHE continued our efforts to defeat this bill during the off-season, and it made a difference. Several NCHE leaders volunteered countless hours lobbying the legislators, attending meetings, and keeping NCHE members informed. The sacrificial giving of their time and efforts in rallying homeschoolers from across the state saved us from having to live with an onerous homeschool law.

Debbie reflects on this time: "I remember this time of intense lobbying. It was a ton of work—letters written, phone calls made (long-distance), and trips to Raleigh. Today, we take for granted how easy communication is, but back then, there were no email or cell phones. Long distance phone calls cost money, and to get the word out, we used phone chains. Much of the work was done late at night when long distance calls were cheaper.

The Ever-Changing Nest

Isn't it funny that we use the same analogy to describe both ends of our primary parenting years? This irony struck me several weeks ago as I tackled a small stack of dishes waiting patiently for me on the counter. I walked by with a sigh and thought, "Why not? I have plenty of time and nothing else to do." Plenty of time. Too much time, as a matter of fact. Suddenly, my mind wandered back over the years to the time I was expecting my first child. As I busied myself preparing for the baby's arrival, someone explained I was in the nesting phase. I was nesting because I wouldn't have time after the baby came. Now, I find myself precariously close to the other side, the empty-nest side, and I seem to have nothing but time.

Now that barren landscapes and frigid temperatures have given way to the blooming colors and warmth of spring, many families will be celebrating graduation. For those who are graduating a student for the first time, the changing shape of the nest is just beginning. As pride and joy mingle with the aching reality of letting go, the shift is subtle. Other families are just beginning their homeschool journey and are managing the challenges and changes that come with a growing nest. Every reshaping of our nest brings its own unique set of challenges and joys. Let's consider three basic phases of the ever-changing nest that encompass the primary years of parenting.

The First: The Growing Nest

This season holds all the sweetness of spring as new life breathes with the scent of newborn babes, and the anticipation of waiting is fulfilled. Some families have already decided to homeschool their children before any arrive in the nest,

while others sense that calling later. I was the latter of the two. When all my girlfriends chattered excitedly about homeschooling a large brood of children, I secretly thought they were a little strange. That was until I held my newborn son, and the word responsibility took on a weight and meaning I had never understood. Five years and two siblings later, Garner Christian Academy opened its elementary doors to my little flock of three. With each birth came the challenges of sleep deprivation, postpartum depression, and the general struggles of life with lots of little people. Even those early days held a lot of lessons for my chickadees: patience, obedience, the order of routine, and being a good helper. Those may seem like lofty goals to those who are continually adding to their nest, but they are achievable and worthy of the time and energy it takes to train little hearts. Probably the most challenging part of this phase is when your oldest ones need to "do school" while their toddler and infant siblings compete for time and attention as well. One of the joys of this phase is watching your young child encounter the world with a fresh innocence of fascination. I remember strolling through the park when our oldest son was around three years old and experiencing the enthusiasm he had as he ran over to the brightly colored pansies lining the walk, jabbering with words that only he understood. Although this is an exhausting phase, words I heard long ago have proven true: the days are long, but the years are short.

The Next: The Molding Nest

At some point, families stop adding new arrivals. For some, this happens sooner rather than later, and there is a clear delineation between the first two phases of nesting. For other, larger families, the two may overlap for quite some time. But the commonality is this: your nest starts to mold around the people and personalities in your family. Things become a little less physically taxing but more emotionally exhausting. Suddenly, your sweet little fledglings start having strong opinions and even stronger attitudes. Emotions run high, and hormones surge as puberty hits. Academically, the workload increases, and so does the level of resistance. I had one child who, at fourteen, could rival the most experienced lawyer when it came to arguments. It always started with the words, "Well technically...." Then there was the child who learned to fly below the radar and lived the motto "out of sight, out of mind" to avoid doing school as much as possible. About the time you're tempted to throw in the towel, they do something amazing that warms your heart as hope blossoms. An older child reads tenderly to a younger sibling. Someone does a chore without being asked. The math lesson finally clicks. The middle school years seem to hold both ends of the bittersweet spectrum.

The Last: The Emptying Nest

By the time your brood reaches their high school years, life finds a certain sweetness. There is joy in watching as each one develops more fully into who they are created to be as they discover their talents and skills. Some thrive in academic realms, while others hit their stride in athletics, music, or hobbies. My oldest son was a developed chess player and discovered computer programming, which is his current profession. My daughter loved playing basketball and working at summer camps. The next son was active in civil service and learned automotive skills as a hobby. My youngest daughter is currently involved in speech and debate, loves ballroom dance, and is a serious weightlifter. I am amazed to see how the Lord is using their gifts and desires to ready them for kingdom work, both directly and indirectly. When it comes to high school academics, parents should move their students to greater levels of independence and give them the freedom and room to thrive and, ultimately, to fly. Letting go after holding them close for so long is hard, but that is our goal and aim: to shoot our arrows into the world and watch the Lord unfold his faithful plan in their lives.

Currently, I stand painfully close to the outer edges of an empty nest. I only have two years left with my youngest. She's straining to flap her wings of independence, and I know from experience that the next couple of years will pass in a blur. Just last summer, she worked part-time, and for the first time in nearly twenty-five years, I came home to an empty house. The coming void weighs heavy on my heart, and I am savoring the last of tournaments and dance drop-offs and late-night chats. So, to all the young mommas out there, hold them close, read that bedtime story one more time, and snuggle just a minute longer. To those navigating the middle years, hold your temper and your tongue and hug them tightly; they secretly want you to. And to my fellow moms out there who are watching your heart walk out the door to their next chapter in life, remember the wise words of King Solomon: "For everything there is a season..." (Ecclesiastes 1:1)

Your last child is in his senior year. Graduation is coming, and you are frantically wrapping up your school year, getting senior photos and invitations ready, party planning, and starting to accumulate what your student needs for life beyond homeschooling. For your student, it may be a job, college, or continuing at home through the local community college. Nevertheless, your life is about to change. Think of it as omega to alpha—ending to beginning.

To understand the beginning, first think about what is changing. If this is your last child to graduate, you will no longer attend co-op classroom days, do any lesson planning, shop for curricula, or schedule field trips. There won't be any more debate trips or sports competitions. Your friendship circle will change because your friends may still be homeschooling, or they, too, will be finding new pastures. If your child leaves home, you'll be downsizing your grocery budget, and meal prep will change for the remaining one or two of you. In short, everything about your life is about to change because your central focus has been your family and homeschooling, and it no longer will be. So, what about your continued involvement with homeschooling?

My last child graduated high school in 2014, so I'm now a ten-year retiree. But I haven't stopped caring about homeschoolers. As I watch our country and schools change, my resolve to support the homeschooling movement has never been stronger. I could have dropped my membership with NCHE and stopped going to the Thrive! Conference. I could have sold all of my books. I could have turned the corner and never really looked back, with the exception of treasured homeschooling memories. 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Easy Summer Writing Ideas for the Family

Summer is often a time of relaxation and family travel. Many of us take several weeks off of our homeschooling adventures to enjoy the warm season. Learning, however, can take place anywhere and anytime. There are numerous reasons to incorporate learning into summer activities. It prevents skill regression or at least limits it. It keeps curiosity for new things, and it reminds us that learning can be an everyday activity without the formality of structure.

If your child needs to work on their writing, then taking off the summer months may not be your best option. There is good news! Writing activities do not have to be formal or graded. They can be easy and impromptu and short and sweet. Take the headache out of summer writing with these fun ideas:

- 1. Nature Journal: Summer is a time of walks along the beach or hikes on the trail or even morning strolls at the park. Grab a small, flip notebook from the dollar store that can work as an *investigative* notebook, and have your child write out what they *spy* on their nature walks. What can they uncover? What clues in nature can they report?
- 2. How-To Picture Book: Is your child a master at a certain skill (even if they are a master in their own mind)? Do they enjoy cooking or playing games? Do they enjoy a sport or a favorite daily activity? Take plain white paper and fold it in half to make a How-To book. For each section, they write simple directions to help a "novice" learn the skill. Make sure there are drawings to go along with the directions! At the end, they will have a small How-To picture book.
- 3. Before and After Q and A: Summertime often includes trips to museums, national parks, or visits to important monuments. Before the visit, discuss with your child questions they have about the place. Come up with

your own questions, and together, write them down. These questions can be silly (Do they serve ice cream?) to more content-rich (Will the museum have authentic artifacts to view?). After the visit, go back to the list of questions and answer them based on the experience.

- 4. A Night at the Movies: This activity can work for movies or books or even vacation destinations. Have your children (and yourself) write reviews after watching the movie (or after reading the book or after the vacation). First, start with a five-star rating. Would your child rate the movie five stars for excellent, one star for not enjoying it, or somewhere in between? They then jot down a couple of reasons why they gave it that rating. Once everyone is done, share it with each other and see if everyone agrees.
- 5. Devotional Time: Many parents like to encourage their children to spend some time learning about God and His Word. There are children's devotions that also incorporate a writing portion. At Late November Literary, we offer *Journaling through Scriptures* to help tweens and teens blend devotion time with writing. No journal or devotional is necessarily needed though. Consider a small notebook for a gratitude journal. Make it a partner activity where you work on it together. No matter what you decide, this type of activity is a blessing year-round.

There are a lot of ways to incorporate easy summer writing activities in your child's daily or weekly routine. This article provided some fun ideas for you to try this season! When connected to family activities, writing can be simple and streamlined while still teaching critical thinking and communication skills. Don't let the summer slip away without trying to grow some writing! You'll be glad you did.








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NCHE's 2024 Graduates
